You may not enjoy all the marching, or the fact that everything is on a pretty tight schedule here, but be thankful that we're not being swarmed by bees.

On Friday, June 2, a rest area on Interstate 29, about eight miles north of Platte City, was closed after a fatal two-vehicle collision released hundreds of thousands of bees in the area.

A truck carrying 500 hives, each containing 30,000 bees, was struck on the back end by a car driven by Andrea Cunningham, 23, of St. Joseph. The tractor-trailer was parked along the entrance ramp of the rest area. Because of damage to the truck, the bees had to be moved to another truck to complete their trip from Texas to South Dakota. Cunningham's passenger, David Ray, also 23 and from St. Joseph, was killed in the crash.

The rest area reopened yesterday, but people were wary of whether or not to enter the store. They feared being attacked by stow-away bees that had grown to the size of basketballs due to living off nothing but Wheaties while hiding out in the store.

"PHILIP MORRIS USA believes that applying this extra rigor to reportedly higher youth reach and readership is consistent with its commitment to lower the profile of tobacco advertising and its mission to responsibly market its products only to adults," Philip Morris said in a statement Monday.

Washington state Attorney General Christine Gregoire applauded the move.

"One of the reasons we sued tobacco companies was to stop them from targeting kids to make them the next generation of smokers," said Gregoire, president of the National Association of Attorneys General.

"We are concerned about readers, not necessarily subscribers, and this is a major step toward reducing the exposure of our kids to the hard sell of tobacco," she added.

Magazine readership numbers are generally much higher than subscription figures, especially among teen-agers.

Two studies released last month criticized cigarette companies, including Philip Morris, for supposedly "targeting" persons under 18 through advertising, marketing and promotions, despite agreeing not to do so as part of the \$206 billion settlement reached in 1998 with 46 states.

One study, by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, said cigarette advertising in magazines with a significant percentage of teen readers had increased during the first nine months of 1999 by almost \$30 million, to \$119.9 million.

The study specifically criticized the placement of a Marlboro ad on the back cover of Rolling Stone magazine with teen-age singing phenom Britney Spears on the front.


Monday's announcement drew cautious praise from one anti-tobacco advocacy group.

"If it's permanent and not riddled with loopholes, Philip Morris' decision to withdraw its cigarette advertising from magazines with high-youth readership is a positive step that should be followed by the other tobacco companies," said Matthew Myers, president of Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids.

Philip Morris said it would honor all existing advertising commitments, but would stop tobaccoimage advertising in 40 to 50 publications by September, though it said it reserves the right to place "issues-oriented ads."

Those magazines include Entertainment Weekly, Mademoiselle, Newsweek and TV Guide.



SIMPSON MAY TAKE LIE DETECTOR TEST FOR FEE

Los Angeles, June 5 - O.J. Simpson said he never took a polygraph test about his ex-wife's murder, but is willing to take one now even though "no lie detector test is going to change anyone's mind." Simpson also said he plans to talk to the public for a fee through an Internet connection within the next few weeks. Part of the money, he said, would go to various charities, including The Innocence Project, which works to free wrongly convicted prisoners. "I've always wanted to be able to talk directly to the public," Simpson said in a telephone interview Monday night with The Associated Press. "It's amazing how many people don't know the facts of my case."

Bailey has been trying to arrange for a lie-dectector test to be done now, perhaps in a pay-per-view TV format.

"Lee and I talked all the time," Simpson said. "He's one of my biggest supporters." But Simpson said he's convinced that if he passed a lie dectector test no one would pay any attention to it. Simpson said the current flap appears to be part of a feud between Bailey and attorney Robert Shapiro. Both men were part of Simpson's defense team in his 1994 criminal trial which resulted in his acquittal for the murders of Nicloe Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman. In a subsequent civil trial he was held liable for the murders. In Naples, Fla., where Bailey is embroiled in a battle to keep his law license, he told of a dispute with Shapiro who took Simpson to see a lie detector expert two days after the killings of Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman in June 1994. Clarifying his earlier remarks, Bailey said Monday: "Shapiro called me in the middle of a polygraph test where all the responses were wild. I read those charts, they are not a polygraph test. Shapiro took the charts, so no one else has ever been able to review them, but I stopped the test for the simple reason that you never, never test anyone for killing a spouse or a child within two or three days of the event."

Bailey, who is reputed to be an expert in the polygraph, said he stopped the test because of Simpshon's emotional state, not because of the answers he was giving. "He has never to this date been tested by anyone, although he has a standing offer to do so under certain conditions,"
