SHERRER'S SPEECH

Committment, character, and courage were the three themes that formed the backdrop of Lieutenant Governor Gary Sheerer's speech yesterday, at McCain Auditorium. Sheerer was the key-note speaker at the first assembly of the 63rd annual Kansas Boys' State.

In his speech he stressed the above mentioned "three c's", as the secret to success. He told of how he had dreamed as a young boy to someday have his name on the door of a state capitol office, and that these three qualities had above all else led him there.

Speaking of courage, he told of how as a little boy he had seen first-hand the power of segregation. From his experience, he realized that it was necessary for people to have the courage to stand up to speak out for what was right.

He also told a short story chronicling the life of Edmond Ross, a U.S. senator from Kansas during the Andrew Johnson Administration. Ross voted to acquit the President during impeachment proceedings, thus swinging the tally in favor of keeping Johnson in office. Ross's vote upset many Kansans who were in favor of ousting the President from office, ending the Senator's career and ruining his reputation. Sheerer said that Ross's actions displayed true courage, and that he hoped he had showed similar courage in his life.

Stater Wes Magyar of Hutchinson and MacArthur County said that he felt Sheerer's speech was not only sincere but that it was also peppered with good advice.

"He had some real good things to say; some things that really urged me on to run for a spot in the senate," Magyar said. "Anyone who can keep me wide awake like that must have been speeking the truth."

His speeches at Boys' State have become commonplace, so much so, that after being presented with a Boys' State t-shirt, the comment was made that he should start a ball team and name it after Boys' State.
