The Sons of the American Legion is a group of dedicated Americans that is not eligible to be members of the American Legion. They are sons, grandsons and step-sons of Legionnaires.

Two such Sons volunteering this week at Boys' State are Royce Tinkler and John Dalke. Tinkler, a Salina resident, is here for his fourth State since he began in 1995. Dalke, from Hillsboro, was a Stater in 1983 and was a legal counselor in '83 and '84; became an advisor in '98.

Dalke and Tinkler say that the most important thing the Sons do is to support the Legion by doing projects such as raising the colors at Legion ceremonies and sponsoring boys for Boys' State. In addition, they have their own fundraisers and volunteer activities: toy runs, adopting highways, and sponsoring sports teams.

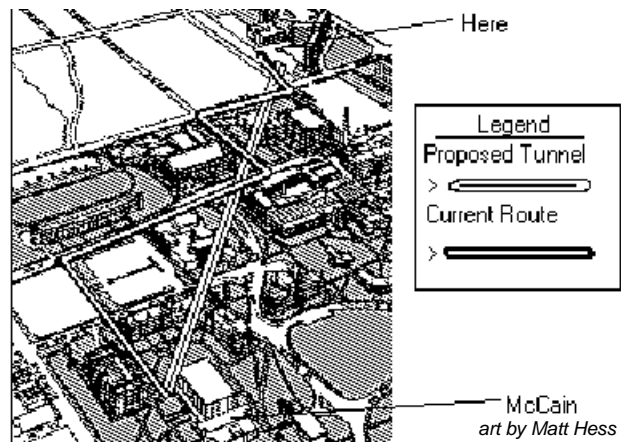
