DEBATE

Yesterday Boys' Staters had a chance to view the candidates running for state offices in a head to head debate. The proceeding was held at McCain Auditorium immediately following speeches by the Secretary of State and the Attorney General.

The format pitted the Nationalists against the Federalists in a series of primary questions and rebuttals. The questions were drawn up by a board consisting of representatives from the associations, and precinct men, and were generally directed toward the major subjects. The major highlights were as follows:

Commissioner of Insurance

The Federalist candidate Ross Morris and Nationalist candidate Kevin Green agreed, for the most part, on answers to both of the questions asked to them. The questions involved the setting of insurance rates based upon race, sex, and age, and a question dealing with emergency crop insurance for farmers. The answers showed no direct differences between the candidates.

State Treasurer

Nationalist candidate Danny Raceur faced off against Federalist Nathan Ewert over questions about the appropriation of state funds to counties, and what to do with surplus tax revenue. In general, Raceur suggested giving the counties a lot of control over state funds, while Ewert suggested insuring that the money was sent to help in areas such as education and farming. Ewert stressed that surplus funds immediately be sent to help farmers.

Attorney General

A fiery Ben Proctor of the Nationalists became quite angered when Federalist Sean Patton gained the support of the crowd with his pro-capitol punishment stance. Proctor suggested a moratorium, but to the crowds delight Patton stood firmly in favor of the death penalty.



Secretary of State

Nationalist Rusty Glenn and Federalist Travis Coberly debated the topic of state regulation of utilities and industry, as well as the attempt to increase the standard of living and maintain current revenue at the same time. Glenn took the liberal viewpoint that deregulation was bad, and that it would lead to the loss of jobs, while Coberly fired back that deregulation would have many long term benefits. They both agreed that money needed to be appropriated to education,

Lieutenant Governor

Evan Deichert of the Federalists combatted with the Nationalist Robert Smeil over environmental issues and juvenile handgun laws.

Governor

Federalist candidate Joe Gardenhire and Nationalist Nick Melezedo went at it over the topics of abortion, education, the Conservation Reserve Plan, and state sponsored health care. Melezedo took a typical Liberal stance on abortion, suggesting that the girls at Girls' State would be happy to know that Boys' State was pro-choice, while Gardenhire became a demagogue when he appealed to the Conservatives in the crowd by taking a hard anti-abortion stance.

When education was brought up, the Liberals quickly brought up their Fiscal Equality Plan, which in fact, none of them knew a thing about. This left a

gaping hole in their armor, as Gardenhire quickly stepped in, and suggested that the State give more money to counties for education. Once again he received a loud applause.

When CRP and health care were discussed both candidates stuck to their party's platform, but the Nationalist candidate did try a sly move. He attempted to gain support by shout, with his hand raised, the phrase, "rock Kansas," repeatedly. The slogan was immediately deamed "not cool" by the crowd, and he received blank stares rather than cheers.

COMMITTEE SEARCHES FOR IDENTITIES OF POW/MIA

Gary Davis, the Powell County advisor, is also the state chairman for the American Legion's POW/MIA recovery committee.

Davis has chaired the committee for three years now. The state committee reviews information about POW/MIA, (Prisoners of War/ Missing in Action) for accuracy before relaying it to the public.

At the national level, the committee recovers and identifies the remains of U.S. soldiers from Vietnam, Korea and World War II.

Davis said that for now the most important aspect in helping to retrieve all the MIA's is to persuade the government to increase funding for the lab at Camp Smith, Hawaii, which is the headquarters for the recovery projects. Increased funds would help provide more people for search parties, as well as for more forensic experts, said Davis.

According to Davis, the public is generally uninformed about the efforts of the Legion recovery committees. For instance, the reports given to the public in the past said that 54,000 servicemen were killed during Korea. What the reports did not say, says Davis, is that 20,000 were killed outside of Korea. In other words, not because of the war. In addition, Davis said that most Americans don't know that the POW/MIA flag must be flown over all U.S. Post Offices. He is currently urging legislation to require the flag be flown on all state grounds in Kansas. He attributes this general ignorance of POW/MIA status to falsegivings from the media and the government.

In addition to all his efforts in recovering MIA's from past wars, Davis says his main focus is for the future.

"Our main goal, in future wars, is that as soon as the hostilities are over, everyone will return home, either alive or at least identified. I guess you can say that us old geysers are fighting for you guys."

Stars On Verge of Elimination

In the Stanley Cup finals, the New Jersey Devils moved one step closer to taking the series from the Dallas Stars by knocking off Dallas 3-1 on Monday. With the win, New Jersey took a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven-7 series.

The game, considered a must win for Dallas, seemed to be in their control as they held a 1-0 lead early in the third period. Then things fell apart. Three goals in a four minute span by New Jersey put the game and quite possibly the series out of reach for the Stars.

"Obviously, the momentum is on their side," Stars coach Ken Hickcock said. "We have got two days to recoup to get healthy."

Despite the loss, the Dallas players remain optimistic.

"It's not over until it's over," said Star goalie Ed Belfour. "You have to go in there with the mindset of playing tough again and that anything can happen."

"It is possible. It's been done before," Stars center Mike Modono said referring to when Toronto came back from a 3-1 deficit against Detroit in 1942.

The Devils are aware that the series is far from finished as well.

"The longer you go in a series, the more things can happen through injuries or bad luck," Devils coach Larry Robinson said. "We know first hand, having come back in a rough series ourselves when we thought that we were down and out."

High Schooler Gonzalez First Pick in Draft

The Florida Marlins made a high schooler exceptionally happy. The Marlins made high schooler Adrian Gonzalez the first pick in the 2000 Major League Baseball draft on Monday.

"For a young player he has quite a lot of experience and leadership qualities," said Marlins scouting director Al Avilia. "He's a tough, determined and hard-working guy. For us, it was a clear picture that we selected the best player in this year's draft."

The 6'2 Gonzalez hit .645 with 13 homers and 34 RBI last season for Eastlake High. He is the first high school infielder to be selected No. 1 since Alex Rodriguez in 1993.

"It's a thrill. It's a dream come true," Gonzalez said. "I've wanted to play professional baseball since I can remember."

Williams Falls in French Quarterfinals

Venus Williams will not get her first grand slam title this year at the French Open, she was eliminated Tuesday in the quarterfinals. Three-time French Open champion Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario knocked off Williams, 6-0, 1-6, 6-2, in a match of long baseline rallies.

Williams, hesitant to approach the net, tried to match groundstrokes with the more consistent Sanchez-Vicario. These long rallies ended 48 times on unforced errors by Williams, 20 coming in the first five games.

Williams rebounded after dropping the first set with a 6-1 win in the second before faltering once more in the third set.

American Monica Seles also was eliminated as she dropped her quarterfinal match to No. 6 seed Mary Pierce, 4-6, 6-3, 6-4.

With both Seles and Williams out of the French it will be the first time in more than 30 years that there will be no Americans in the semifinals at the French Open.

Bichette, Garciaparra Players of the Week

Cincinnati right fielder Dante Bichette was named National League Player of the Week on Monday. Bickette batted .522 and tied the league lead in home runs. Bickette smashed four homers, and drove in six runs in a 4-2 week for the Reds. He led the NL in batting average and slugging percentage (1.087) and also tied the NL lead in total bases (25) and hits (12). *Continued on page 6.*

In the American League, Boston Red Sox shortstop Nomar Garciaparra took Player of the Week honors.

Garciaparra went 13-21 with two homers, three doubles, a stolen base, and six RBI. He led the AL in on-base percentage (.667) and ranked second in slugging percentage.

Rice to stay in San Francisco

The greatest receiver of all time is going to finish his career with the San Francisco 49ers. Jerry Rice has reportedly reached a deal with the 49ers worth a total of \$31.3 million over five years. The contract will save the 49ers about \$1.2 million off the salary cap this year and \$4.5 million next year.

The 49ers called a news conference to announce the deal.

Rice led San Francisco in receptions last season catching 67 balls for 830 yards and five touchdowns.

He goes into the 2000 season as the NFL's career leader in receptions (1,206), receiving yards (18,442), total touchdowns (180), receiving touchdowns (169), most games with at least 100 receiving yards (66), and most 1,000-yard-receiving seasons (12).

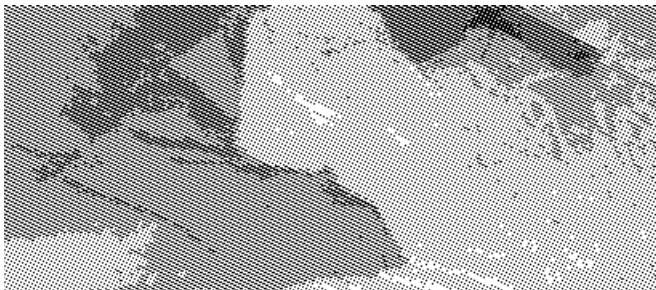
