pause in his first response also stirred whispers.

"He reminded me of people in a spelling bee, when they freeze up," Carl Hollingsworth said. "I felt bad for him, standing up there with nothing to say, but that's part of the game."

"He [Svaty] was very energetic and dynamic and kept the audience's attention," exclaimed Patrick Kuhn.

Representing the Judicial Branch was Judge Pierron, who has been working for the Kansas Court of Appeals for 15 years. He grew up in Olathe and attended Rockhurst University for his undergraduate degree and later attended KU for law school. For the past ten years, Judge Pierron has been making the three-hour trek from Olathe to speak at the Boys State Town Hall meetings.

Judge Pierron began with the history of politics dating to the fore fathers. He then drew on the audience to participate. He created a mock Supreme Court case that was over the drug testing of public candidates in Georgia.

"I really liked Judge Pierron's presentation," said Ben Cummins, Johnson, MacArthur. "He got us more involved, which made us pay attention. Plus, the Judiciary Branch interests me the most."

Aaron Otto was the speaker from the Executive Branch. He is the Legislative and Policy director for Lieutenant Governor John E. Moore. Otto is a graduate of KSU, and graduated from George Washington University with a Master's Degree. He was employed in the Navy for four years before joining Governor Kathleen Sebelius' staff

Otto focused on relationships, showing their importance in his grandfather's relationship with a friend, and how they benefited.

All three speakers gave first-hand accounts political life. They all focused on themes that have proven vital in their lives and will be important to Staters.
