

Debate over Nat, Fed rivalry progresses

Staters "unplug" distractions for the week

American Legion Boys' State has been an extraordinary program for over seven decades allowing students to expand their horizons by exploring politics and leadership roles. There have been many changes and advances in American society since the first Kansas Boys' State session was held in 1937. Modern technological advances have allowed the program to advance, but they have also presented new problems.

The "age of cell phones" has camp counselors and instructors competing with electronic appliances for staters' attention. The use of cell phones as well as other electronic devices is discouraged by Boys' State staff members.

"Cell phones have their place," counselor Brian Droste said. "They are a good tool to call parents at the end of the day or for emergencies. Other than that, [cell phone use] should be kept to a minimum."

Cell phones are not the only problem. Students have attempted to bring appliances ranging from an XBOX to a minifridge into their dorms. The Boys' State staff fears that such appliances could shift stater focus away from the event and toward electronics.

"I feel that Boys' State is an opportunity to unplug from virtual reality and plug into a program that boosts leadership ability," Droste said. "The big issue is that [electronic devices] should not be used during the day because they are not the focus of the program."

Respect is another concern raised by electronic devices. Camp coordinators and advisors have put countless hours of diligent work into preparing this event. Staff fears that electronic distractions demonstrate a clear lack of respect for

these efforts.

"The policy is difficult to enforce because every-body has cell phones, but we really try to discourage cell phone usage," counselor Zach Ewert said. "It is a matter of respect for legionnaires and counselors."

While the staff remains reserved about electronic devices, the staters have different opinions. Cell phone use has become part of youth culture in America. Many staters find electronic device usage beneficial.

"Cell phones are a great form of silent communication that is available anywhere," stater See *Distractions*, page 5



Orman and Chastain inspired staters to make the ultimate Boys State experience. Embrace the experience and make this week the time of your life.




