
I mean, I know it's important and a great opportunity for me to get direct contact with my future leaders and everything, but I can't help it if I'm nodding off during the speeches.

Surprisingly, there were a few candidates that kept my attention the entire time, and those are the ones who earned my vote. But the job of keep-



Federalists advocate protecting constitution

The Federalist Party Convention was held on the evening of Monday, June 2, 2008. Federalist staters from across every county packed the Umberger building to hear their candidates speak. The crowd was rowdy and tensions were high as Federalist candidates took the stage and prepared to deliver their platform to the sea exciting faces in the auditorium.

Proceedings were delayed by the late arrival of the Marshall County Federalists. After a series of chants, songs, and human sacrifices, the convention began. Introductions were provided followed by the introduction of the Federalist candidates.

The convention be-

gan in controversy with the appointment of James Mullins to Lieutenant Governor. Former governor candidate James Mullins retains some infamy from the "Dream Team Scandal", more commonly known as the "Evil Empire", but he approaches his new responsibilities enthusiastically. Mullins urged the majority Federalist Party to unify for voting strength.

McNeal, famous for his "that aint right" slogan, possesses a strong background of service to the community. His goals are to insure that everyone is taken care of including big business. None of this would be possible without the financial planning of State Treasurer Candidate Dakota Meyers.

Meyers presented an honest message of "money for the people". Meyers plans to lower taxes on people as well as big business. Meyers was followed by one of the more energetic figures of the convention, Zach LaRue.

Attorney General Candidate and self-described sasquatch Zach LaRue proposed his policies by employing simple allegories. LaRue promises to fight for justice and plans to defend the Constitution. LaRue emphasized the protection of the right to bear arms. LaRue's energetic appearance was followed by the introduction of the Federalist Governor Candidate.

Federalist Governor Candidate Andrew Koucky enthusiastically took the pandemonium stage as arose in the crowd. Koucky proposed lowering taxes and promoting the local government. He stated that all Constitutional Amendments must be protected. He ended his speech with some famous words from President Ronald Reagan.

She then joined the Navy on her 20th birthday and completed her basic training at Hunter College in New York. Frances chose to study radio communications and learned Morse code. She completed her studies and was stationed on Bainbridge Island in Washington, where she used her skills as a radio operator and gathered important intelligence for the military.



Alex has a few main points to his campaign, including an effort to improve schools, build on communities, improve the environment and keep the Kansas economy strong.


As part of school improvement, money will be allocated to the proper points of funding so the best education possible can be achieved.

City and county commissioners could be seen in session Monday as staters passed through the commons and corridors of Goodnow Hall. The commissioners were in deep discussion preparing for the week by striving to craft a pleasant city and county for all staters to reside in.

Kennedy County commissioner Bill Unsderfer is truly passionate about his position.

"I like seeing laws being passed and effects immediately," Unsderfer said. "I can build up the county to a position where we are very powerful among all counties in the state."
