






Algernon Black once said, "Why not let people differ about their answers to the great mysteries of the Universe? Let each seek one's own way to the highest, to one's own sense of supreme loyalty in life, one's ideal of life. Let each philosophy, each world-view bring forth its truth and beauty to a larger perspective, that people may grow in vision, stature and dedication."

Essentially, Black was arguing that diversity of opinion makes individuals and society stronger and more culturally rich. Of the many lessons Boys State teaches its delegates, this is one of the most important. That is why during the week the program emphasizes the need for dialogue and friendly debate.

Throughout the week delegates will be introduced to many new experiences and ways of thinking and being. This is a result of the diverse

backgrounds from which our delegates come and their differences in terms of race, religion, political ideology and future goals.

At Boys State we encourage everyone to share their unique interests and beliefs. This is not merely an exercise in multiculturalism for the sake of multiculturalism, but is an attempt to show the necessity of cooperation and interaction among people with diverse experiences. For example, the problems that delegates will face throughout the week do not have set solutions and no one view of the world will provide the necessary answers.

There is an old story about a group of blind men that came upon an elephant. Each of them touches a different part of the animal and come to very different conclusions about what it is. One man touches the trunk and insists that it must be a snake, while another man embraces

the leg and emphatically states that it must be the trunk of the tree. Finally, a third man grabs the elephant's tail and declares that the others are wrong because it most definitely is a rope. For some time, the men continue to argue until a fourth man comes along and explains to them that they are all close, but have overlooked the entirety of the picture. Just like the story of the blind men and the elephant, the delegates this week will face problems that they cannot fully grasp on the experiences of any one individual. Instead they will have to share and collaborate in order to understand the problems they face and discover possible solutions.


