With general elections looming and brand new party platforms in place, many staters have been asking themselves about what they value most within their party's platforms. Additionally, with a 50/50 split of the parties, one party must differentiate themselves and gain support from the other side.

them."

In the middle of the day, the debates were underway and ballots were cast. After a strong showing from Federalist candidate Noah Gould, there was unease in the air of the Nationalist party regarding their chances for governor.

This unease was clearly felt for a reason as the Federalists seized the positions of state treasurer in Logan Claasen Wilson and governor and lieutenant governor in Gould and Chris Taylor. Interestingly, Gould chose Taylor from the Nationalist party to run as his lieutenant governor. Despite the gubernatorial win, the nationalists still took the majority of positions in the general election with secretary of state in Patrick Olson, Attorney General in Ajay Lohr, and Commissioner of Insurance in David Drake.

Following the general election, the Executive and Legislative branches will be tasked to pass a budget before 3 pm Wednesday August 4. If no vote is passed, a Government shutdown will occur. If you have any desire to lobby for allocation it is up to you, staters, to speak with your representatives before this time and make your voice heard!

By Jonah Kim -Staters Union James Snyder served in the reserves for six years and is an American legion member dedicated to supporting the veterans. He grew up going


