Bill Breakdown

Over the past few days the Senate and the House of Representatives have been passing bills like it is their job. Going back and forth between ideas on how to make everyone's lives better. Bills would be amended or turned down completely. These bills would have an impact on everyone involved in the simulation. Here is a breakdown of some of the bills that passed.

Prisons have always needed some improvements like allowing prisoners to have access to education and that is what the Prison Education Bill enacts. This bill allows inmates to receive education only if they choose. If inmates are learning and have good behavior after a year they could have three months removed from their sentence.

Emergency aid relief bill is tailor made for the departments. Each department will allocate 5% of their funds for emergency relief. Half of these funds will be used for public safety in the event of an emergency. These funds will be distributed to the counties by the department of human resources. The National guard will oversee and enforce HR decisions.

The bill is tailored toward the department of economy. 25% of their funds will be dedicated to infrastructure. Each county will receive 5% of these funds for their own use. This bill is intended for counties to grow and develop.
