ast night, the Nationalists and the Federalists met in the Carl R. Ice College of Engineering, and the candidates for the different state positions gave their speeches to their respective parties. After a night full of presentations and speeches, Monday night caucusing has come to a close. Starting out the evening for the Federalists was Commissioner of Insurance, followed by State Treasurer, Attorney General, Secretary of State, and Governor, respectively. A total of 22 speeches were given for that party. Some candidates gave outstanding speeches containing their agendas within the caucus, while others focused on a more humorous approach to their campaign. All campaigners gave a ninety second speech, followed up with a question which they had 30 seconds to answer.
