The Bodacious Budget Proposal:

The Media Team was able to observe Wednesday's joint session with the new Governor, Lieutenant, Secretary, Treasurer, and Attorney General. He began by discussing the new tax policies that would be implemented upon the passing of the budget. As promised, the lower two tax brackets had their rates halved, while the three higher brackets had increased rates on varying amounts (see table). A common concern shared among observers was the fact that rather than gradual tax increases, the two highest brackets nearly doubled immediately, to

which the Governor stated that the rates increased similarly the year before as well. Another observer supported the taxes, rebutting that people would easily be able to make money back from taxes considering it is going towards roads, highways, infrastructure, etc., which makes Kansas look favorable for commerce and a stimulated economy. After taxes, the Governor proposed the costs of his projects. The total cost for expenditures was just above \$901,000, a huge leap from the roughly \$726,000 dollar estimate last year. He spent a while discussing each department and their contributions to each county;

The Department of Education, Culture and Tourism would use a State University fund of \$30,000, giving each 5 counties \$17,500 for k-12 education programs.

The Department of Natural Resources and Public Utilities is given a \$7,005 telephone and fiber optic line, with one power station per city, as per the request of the department heads.

The Department of Commerce and Transportation* is planned with a total of \$35,000 dollars, which go to state highways and freight railroads systems.

The Department of Health and Safety* is given a \$10,000 State Jail and \$10,000 State Hospital.

*Executive order was also given to hold extra funds in these departments for misc. actions

Despite the jump in cost, with the new tax policies in place, \$1,651 will still be carried into the next fiscal year, which met the goals of the Governor to be around \$2,000 dollars.


